Pianist Kirk Lightsey just turned 60 but isn't nearly as well known as he should be more than four decades into his career.

Goodbye Mr. Evans (Evidence), our Album of the Month, shows how commanding a presence the man is: his clarity of phrase and knack for putting that note or chord right where it *belongs* shine through, whether on Jimmy Heath's delicious, riff-driven "A New Blue," Lightsey's own sinewy "Habiba" (an earlier version is often excerpted on NPR news), a lyrical adaptation of a Chopin piece, or Phil Woods' moving title ballad; Bill Evans would have been honored. Tibor Elekes plays rock-solid bass lines, and drummer Don Moye (Lightsey's colleague in the Leaders) is a revelation: rarely heard in this mainstream context, his polyrhythms are the perfect foil for Lightsey's crystalline lines.
